Over two years and more than 6,000 voices recorded, you completed we are pound to have released last month our second annual *Voice of the Foster Care Community* report. This report builds on the Voices Report 2022 and tells the real story of foster care from Youth in Foster Care, Caregivers, and Frontline workers.

Are you looking for a supportive space to ask questions about sex, relationships, identity, and or more? OkaySo is an organization that provides free, anonymous support to individuals seeking answers to their personal questions. With OkaySo, you can create a personal account, select a team of experts, and ask your questions without fear of judgment or shame.

OkaySo strives to remind its users that they are loved and valued just the way they are. Whether it is questions about sexual orientation or gender identity or wanting to learn more about the



LGBTQ+ community, OkaySo has resources and experts to support you every step of the way.

How does it work? Within 24 hours of submitting your question, a real person with expertise in your topic will respond. And if you're curious about what others are asking, you can check out the questions that other users have given permission to share.

At OkaySo, they believe that everyone deserves access to accurate and compassionate information about their bodies, relationships, and identities. So, why settle for a Google search when you can get your questions answered by a real human?

Your Experiences Are Making a Difference!

This year we released our first-ever *Lived Experience to Fixing Foster Care*. We kicked the release of the guidebook and the Voices report off with a youth panel sharing the valuable input of over 4,500 Youth, Caregivers, and Frontline Workers; coupled with last year's report, 6,000 lived experience voices have shaped this compendium's comprehensive findings and recommendations. During the event, a panel of remarkable youth shared their personal experiences within the child welfare system, delving into the seven key findings and recommendations highlighted in the guidebook.

A few of our biggest takeaways from the conversation:

Putting the child at the center: Child welfare needs to provide contextual guidelines to what they have available to youth. They, the youth, can better ask for help and provide concise and conducive feedback to the adjuncts they may be asked of and from. Because it takes a village, no one worker or caregiver can do it all.



Prevention through poverty alleviation: Instead of removing the children because of poverty, the parents should at least be offered resources to recover from the poverty in at least a timeline or timeframe.



"I feel like instead of removing the children because of poverty, the parents should at least be offered resources to recover from the poverty in at least a timeline or timeframe—then after that, if they don't do the necessary things, then take [the children]. I feel that we should not take [kids] just because of poverty." — Jasmine Gibson, TAY Peer Navigator

Caregiver profession: Making caregiving a profession would instill a swath of standards that will then serve as the structural foundation for the profession to build upon.

Auto-enrollment: Auto-enrollment would make sure that everyone knows what's available to them, and then it's their choice on whether they want to take the services or not.

Self-sufficiency is a choice: Placing youth back into their original homes when the root of the cause of the issue that they were removed from in the first place hasn't been fixed only causes more damage.

We are delighted at the receptions that the guidebook has already received from experts and community members in the field on the impact of sharing these solutions grounded in the experiences of the people who have gone through it.
